Build, Recycle, Repeat

Two high-design pavilions amp up Millennium Park this summer

One of the greatest things about Chicago is its amazing architecture, both past and present. This June we toast the 100th anniversary of the famous *Plan of Chicago*. Written in 1909 by local architects Daniel Burnham and Edward Bennett, the Burnham Plan, which called for reclaiming the lakefront for the public and expanding the parks, changed the way we think about urban planning. As part of the anniversary celebrations, two world-renowned architects—Zaha Hadid of London and Ben Van Berkel of UNStudio in Amsterdam—created bold, cutting-edge designs inspired by Burnham's vision. They'll be on display this summer starting June 19 at the South Chase Promenade in Millennium Park. Each is temporary and recyclable: Hadid's structure is aluminum covered with a tent-like fabric featuring skylight slits and an inside video display, and Van Berkel's design is a canopy highlighting colorful nighttime lighting. Both are expected to be viewed by millions of people this summer, and we're pretty sure the man who said "make no little plans" would be proud. ■

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
